AN ACT

RELATING TO CANNABIS REGULATION; CHANGING DEFINITIONS;  
PROVIDING POWERS AND DUTIES; PROVIDING PROCEDURES FOR CRIMINAL  
HISTORY BACKGROUND CHECKS; PROHIBITING DRIVE-UP WINDOWS AT  
CANNABIS RETAIL ESTABLISHMENTS; REMOVING THE PROHIBITION  
AGAINST A PERSON OWNING BOTH A CANNABIS LICENSE AND A LICENSE  
UNDER THE LIQUOR CONTROL ACT; PROHIBITING CO-LOCATION OF  
CANNABIS ACTIVITIES AND ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGE SALES OR SERVICE  
ACTIVITIES TO THE PUBLIC OR MEMBERS OF PRIVATE CLUBS; PROVIDING  
FOR INVESTIGATORY CONFIDENTIALITY; ALLOWING FOR LICENSEE  
CONVERSION FROM NONPROFIT TO FOR-PROFIT CORPORATE STATUS;  
CHANGING PACKAGING REQUIREMENTS; REPLACING LICENSURE WITH  
REGISTRATION OF CANNABIS TRAINING AND EDUCATION PROGRAMS;  
INCLUDING THE CANNABIS REGULATION ACT IN THE RACKETEERING ACT,  
THE DELINQUENCY ACT AND THE UNIFORM LICENSING ACT; INCLUDING  
CANNABIS IN A LIST OF CONTRABAND IN JAILS AND PRISONS; CREATING

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1 CRIMES; PRESCRIBING PENALTIES; REPEALING A DELAYED REPEAL;  
2 AMENDING, REPEALING AND ENACTING SECTIONS OF THE NMSA 1978.

4 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

5 SECTION 1. Section 14-2-1 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 1947,  
6 Chapter 130, Section 1, as amended) is amended to read:

7 "14-2-1. RIGHT TO INSPECT PUBLIC RECORDS--EXCEPTIONS.--  
8 Every person has a right to inspect public records of this  
9 state except:

10 A. records pertaining to physical or mental  
11 examinations and medical treatment of persons confined to an  
12 institution;

13 B. letters of reference concerning employment,  
14 licensing or permits;

15 C. letters or memoranda that are matters of opinion  
16 in personnel files or students' cumulative files;

17 D. portions of law enforcement records as provided  
18 in Section 14-2-1.2 NMSA 1978;

19 E. as provided by the Confidential Materials Act;

20 F. trade secrets;

21 G. attorney-client privileged information;

22 H. long-range or strategic business plans of public  
23 hospitals discussed in a properly closed meeting;

24 I. tactical response plans or procedures prepared  
25 for or by the state or a political subdivision of the state,

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1 the publication of which could reveal specific vulnerabilities,  
2 risk assessments or tactical emergency security procedures that  
3 could be used to facilitate the planning or execution of a  
4 terrorist attack;

5 J. information concerning information technology  
6 systems, the publication of which would reveal specific  
7 vulnerabilities that compromise or allow unlawful access to  
8 such systems; provided that this subsection shall not be used  
9 to restrict requests for:

10 (1) records stored or transmitted using  
11 information technology systems;

12 (2) internal and external audits of  
13 information technology systems, except for those portions that  
14 would reveal ongoing vulnerabilities that compromise or allow  
15 unlawful access to such systems; or

16 (3) information to authenticate or validate  
17 records received pursuant to a request fulfilled pursuant to  
18 the Inspection of Public Records Act;

19 K. submissions in response to a competitive grant,  
20 land lease or scholarship and related scoring materials and  
21 evaluation reports until finalists are publicly named or the  
22 award is announced; ~~and~~

23 L. information developed or obtained by the  
24 cannabis control division of the regulation and licensing  
25 department during an enforcement investigation; and

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1                   ~~[E.]~~ M. as otherwise provided by law."

2                   SECTION 2. Section 26-2C-1 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 2021  
3 (1st S.S.), Chapter 4, Section 1) is amended to read:

4                   "26-2C-1. SHORT TITLE.--~~[Sections 1 through 42 of this~~  
5 ~~act]~~ Chapter 26, Article 2C NMSA 1978 may be cited as the  
6 "Cannabis Regulation Act"."

7                   SECTION 3. Section 26-2C-2 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 2021  
8 (1st S.S.), Chapter 4, Section 2) is amended to read:

6 (1) means all parts of the plant genus  
7 *Cannabis* containing a delta-9-tetrahydrocannabinol  
8 concentration of more than three-tenths percent on a dry weight  
9 basis, whether growing or not; the seeds of the plant; the  
10 resin extracted from any part of the plant; and every compound,  
11 manufacture, salt, derivative, mixture or preparation of the  
12 plant, its seeds or its resin; and

13 (2) does not include:

14 (a) the mature stalks of the plant;  
15 fiber produced from the stalks; oil or cake made from the seeds  
16 of the plant; any other compound, manufacture, salt,  
17 derivative, mixture or preparation of the mature stalks, fiber,  
18 oil or cake; or the sterilized seed of the plant that is  
19 incapable of germination; or

20 (b) the weight of any other ingredient  
21 combined with cannabis [~~products~~] to prepare topical or oral  
22 administrations, food, drink or [~~another~~] other product;

24 of a licensed premises where cannabis products may be served  
25 and consumed;

7 ~~that allows a person to directly offer, sell or serve cannabis~~

14 [person] facility that samples, collects and tests cannabis

19 ~~public post-secondary educational institution designed to~~  
20 ~~prepare students for participation in the cannabis industry;~~

22 (1) means the cultivation, production,  
23 possession, manufacture, storage, testing, researching,  
24 packaging and labeling, transportation, couriering, purchase  
25 for resale, sale or consignment of cannabis products; and



1 (2) does not include activities related only  
2 to the medical cannabis program [~~to cannabis training and~~  
3 ~~education programs~~] or to the personal cultivation or use of  
4 cannabis products;

5 [~~S.~~] O. "consumer" means a person twenty-one years  
6 of age or older who legally purchases, acquires, owns,  
7 possesses or uses a commercial cannabis product [~~for a purpose~~  
8 ~~other than~~] not for resale or a person who holds a medical  
9 cannabis program registry identification card issued by the  
10 department of health or is a reciprocal participant;

11 [~~F.~~] P. "contaminant" means pesticides and other  
12 foreign material, such as hair, insects or other similar  
13 adulterants, in harvested cannabis;

14 [~~H.~~] Q. "controlling person":

15 (1) means a person that controls a financial  
16 or voting interest of ten percent or more of, or an officer or  
17 board member of, a cannabis establishment; and

18 (2) does not include a bank or licensed  
19 lending institution;

20 [~~V.~~] R. "cultivation" means any activity involving  
21 the planting, growing, harvesting, drying, curing, grading or  
22 trimming of cannabis;

23 [~~W.~~] S. "department" means the regulation and  
24 licensing department;

25 [~~X.~~] T. "director" means the director of the

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1 division;

2 [Y-] U. "division" means the cannabis control  
3 division of the department;

4 [Z-] V. "dry weight basis", when used in the  
5 context of regulation of commercial cannabis activity, means a  
6 process by which delta-9-tetrahydrocannabinol concentration is  
7 measured relative to the aggregate weight of all parts of the  
8 plant genus *Cannabis*, whether growing or not, including the  
9 leaves of the plant, the flowers and buds of the plant, the  
10 seeds of the plant, the resin of the plant and the stalks of  
11 the plant at the point of harvest by a licensee and with no  
12 moisture added to the harvested plant;

14 grounds licensed for the production, [possession] storage,  
15 testing, manufacturing, [or] sale or consumption  
16 of [~~cannabis, cannabis extracts or~~] cannabis products;

17 [BB-] X. "financial consideration" means value that  
18 is given or received, directly or indirectly, through sales,  
19 barter, trade, fees, charges, dues, contributions or donations;

20 [CC-] Y. "homegrown" or "homemade" means grown or  
21 made for purposes that are not [~~dependent or conditioned upon~~  
22 ~~the provision or receipt of financial consideration~~] for  
23 resale;

24 [DD-] ~~"household" means a housing unit and includes~~  
25 ~~any place in or around the housing unit at which an occupant of~~

1 ~~the housing unit produces, manufactures, keeps or stores~~  
2 ~~homegrown cannabis or homemade cannabis products;]~~

3 Z. "illegal cannabis product" means a cannabis  
4 product that is:

5 (1) produced or manufactured outside New  
6 Mexico;

7 (2) produced, manufactured, distributed or  
8 sold in New Mexico by a person not licensed to produce,  
9 manufacture, distribute or sell the cannabis product; or

10 (3) produced, manufactured, distributed or  
11 sold by a person acting outside the limits of the person's  
12 license;

13 provided that "illegal cannabis product" does not include  
14 homegrown or homemade cannabis products that comply with the  
15 provisions of the Cannabis Regulation Act;

16 ~~[EE-]~~ AA. "immature cannabis plant" means a  
17 cannabis plant that has no observable flowers or buds;

18 ~~[FF-]~~ BB. "industry standards" means the prevailing  
19 customary standards of business practice in the cannabis  
20 industry in jurisdictions within the United States;

21 ~~[GG-]~~ CC. "integrated cannabis microbusiness" means  
22 a person that is ~~[authorized]~~ licensed to conduct one or more  
23 of the following:

24 (1) production of cannabis at a single  
25 licensed premises; provided that the person shall not possess

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1 more than two hundred total mature cannabis plants at any one  
2 time;

3 (2) manufacture of cannabis products at a  
4 single licensed premises;

5 (3) sales and transportation of ~~only~~  
6 cannabis products produced or manufactured by that person or  
7 another cannabis producer microbusiness or integrated cannabis  
8 microbusiness;

9 (4) operation of only one retail  
10 establishment; and

11 (5) couriering of cannabis products ~~to~~  
12 ~~qualified patients, primary caregivers or reciprocal~~  
13 ~~participants or directly~~ to consumers;

14 ~~HH-~~ DD. "licensed premises" means a location that  
15 includes:

16 (1) all enclosed public and private areas at  
17 the location that are used in the business and includes  
18 cannabis consumption areas, offices, kitchens, restrooms and  
19 storerooms;

20 (2) all areas outside of a building that are  
21 specifically included in the license; ~~[for the production,~~  
22 ~~manufacturing, wholesale sale or retail sale of cannabis~~  
23 ~~products; and]~~

24 (3) all areas of a standalone cannabis  
25 consumption area, including retail and other areas, whether in

1 enclosed or outside spaces, and including private or members-  
 2 only clubs where cannabis products are available for sale or  
 3 consumption; and

4 ~~[(3)]~~ (4) with respect to a location that is  
 5 specifically licensed for the production of cannabis outside of  
 6 a building, the ~~[entire unit]~~ amount of land that ~~[is created~~

 9 application for licensure for cultivation of cannabis; provided

4 responsible for managing the well-being of a qualified patient

6 Lynn and Erin Compassionate Use Act;

7 [OO-] KK. "public [~~place~~] space" means [~~a~~] any  
8 place to which the general public has access [~~and includes~~  
9 ~~hallways, lobbies and other parts of apartment houses and~~  
10 ~~hotels that do not constitute rooms or apartments designed for~~  
11 ~~actual residence; highways; streets; schools; places of~~  
12 ~~amusement; parks; playgrounds; and places used in connection~~  
13 ~~with public passenger transportation~~];

14 [PP-] LL. "qualified patient" means a resident of  
15 New Mexico who holds a registry identification card pursuant to  
16 the Lynn and Erin Compassionate Use Act;

17 [QQ-] MM. "reciprocal participant" means a person  
18 who is not a resident of New Mexico and who holds proof of  
19 enrollment by a governmental regulatory authority to  
20 participate in the medical cannabis program of another state of  
21 the United States, the District of Columbia or a territory or  
22 commonwealth of the United States in which the person resides  
23 or a person who holds proof of enrollment by a governmental  
24 regulatory authority of a New Mexico Indian nation, tribe or  
25 pueblo to participate in its medical cannabis program;

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1           NN. "residence" or "household" means a housing unit  
2 and includes any place in or around the housing unit that is  
3 not a public space and at which an occupant of the housing unit  
4 produces, manufactures, keeps or stores homegrown or homemade  
5 cannabis products or stores legally purchased cannabis;

6           ~~[RR.]~~ OO. "retail establishment" means a location  
7 at which cannabis products are sold ~~[to qualified patients,~~  
8 ~~primary caregivers and reciprocal participants and]~~ directly to  
9 consumers;

10           ~~[SS.]~~ PP. "superintendent" means the superintendent  
11 of regulation and licensing;

12           ~~[TT.]~~ QQ. "unprocessed" means unaltered from an  
13 original, raw or natural state; and

14           ~~[UU.]~~ RR. "vertically integrated cannabis  
15 establishment" means a person that is authorized to act as  
16 ~~[any]~~ one or more of the following:

21           SECTION 4. Section 26-2C-6 NMSA 1978 (being Laws 2021  
22 (1st S.S.), Chapter 4, Section 6, as amended) is amended to  
23 read:

24           "26-2C-6. LICENSING CANNABIS ACTIVITIES--LIMITATIONS--  
25 MEDICAL CANNABIS LEGACY LICENSING--CANNABIS SHORTAGE FOR

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1 MEDICAL PROGRAM--CONVERSION OF NONPROFIT MEDICAL CANNABIS  
2 CORPORATIONS.--

3 A. The division shall regulate [~~and administer and~~  
4 ~~may collect fees in connection with the administration of~~] the  
5 following in accordance with the Uniform Licensing Act, unless  
6 otherwise provided in the Cannabis Regulation Act:

7 (1) commercial cannabis activity [~~and~~  
8 ~~licensing related to commercial cannabis activity~~];

9 (2) the medical cannabis program, except for  
10 the medical cannabis registry; and

11 (3) all aspects of cannabis relating to  
12 cannabis training and education programs.

13 B. The division [~~shall follow the provisions of the~~  
14 ~~Uniform Licensing Act when licensing or permitting~~] may issue,  
15 renew, deny, suspend or revoke licenses or discipline licensees  
16 for the following:

17 (1) cannabis consumption areas;

18 (2) cannabis couriers;

19 (3) cannabis manufacturers;

20 (4) cannabis producer microbusinesses;

21 (5) cannabis producers;

22 (6) cannabis research laboratories;

23 (7) cannabis retailers;

24 (8) cannabis servers;

25 (9) cannabis testing laboratories;



1 (10) cannabis training and education programs;  
2 (11) integrated cannabis microbusinesses; and  
3 (12) vertically integrated cannabis  
4 establishments.

5 C. The division shall include a clear designation  
6 on all licenses [~~and permits~~] that indicates whether the  
7 license [~~or permit~~] is for medical cannabis activity,  
8 commercial cannabis activity or both [~~or for cannabis training  
9 and education programs~~].

10 D. The division shall issue a license to a cannabis  
11 retailer applicant at a discount if the applicant provides  
12 documentation of an agreement to accept cannabis products on  
13 consignment from a cannabis producer microbusiness or an  
14 integrated cannabis microbusiness [~~licensed pursuant the  
15 Cannabis Regulation Act~~].

16 E. A license is valid for twelve months from the  
17 date the license is issued and may be renewed annually [~~except  
18 that a license issued for a cannabis training and education  
19 program is valid until terminated by the licensee or suspended  
20 or revoked by the division~~]. A licensee shall notify the  
21 division when the licensee begins or ends operations pursuant  
22 to the license.

23 F. The director shall not renew a license [~~issued  
24 pursuant to the provisions of the Cannabis Regulation Act~~]  
25 until the director receives notification from the secretary of

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1 taxation and revenue or the secretary's designee that on a  
2 certain date:

3 (1) the licensee is not a delinquent taxpayer  
4 pursuant to Section 7-1-16 NMSA 1978 only with respect to the  
5 cannabis excise tax or the gross receipts tax; and

6 (2) there are no unfiled tax returns due with  
7 respect to the cannabis excise tax or the gross receipts tax.

8 G. ~~[No]~~ A license shall not be transferable or  
9 assignable from a licensee to another person. The division  
10 shall not allow a person that is licensed as any type of  
11 cannabis establishment other than a cannabis research  
12 laboratory to hold, directly or indirectly, a cannabis testing  
13 laboratory license.

14 H. A license shall not be subject to execution,  
15 attachment, a security transaction, liens or receivership.

16 ~~[H.]~~ I. Except for verification of age, the  
17 division shall not require licensees to request information  
18 from consumers or impose any residency requirement upon  
19 consumers for the purchase of commercial cannabis products  
20 ~~[pursuant to the commercial cannabis activity authorized by the~~  
21 ~~Cannabis Regulation Act]~~. The division may require licensees  
22 to request information from consumers for the purchase of  
23 medical cannabis products, ~~[pursuant to the medical cannabis~~  
24 ~~program]~~ which may include the presentation of legal  
25 identification issued by an authorized governmental entity or

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1 other documents as required by the medical cannabis program.

2 ~~[F.]~~ J. Except as otherwise provided in the  
3 Cannabis Regulation Act, the division shall not limit the  
4 number of licensed premises a licensee may occupy or operate  
5 under a license. Multiple licensees may occupy a single  
6 licensed premises, and the division shall not place any  
7 restriction or prohibition on the number of licensees occupying  
8 a single licensed premises or on the number of licensed  
9 premises of a cannabis establishment except as otherwise  
10 specifically provided for by ~~[the Cannabis Regulation]~~ that  
11 act. A licensee may conduct any lawful activity or any  
12 combination of lawful activities at a licensed premises  
13 ~~[provided that the licensee is not a licensee pursuant to the~~  
14 ~~Liquor Control Act]~~ except that a cannabis licensee shall not  
15 occupy any premises that also houses a business holding a  
16 license under the Liquor Control Act that allows the sale or  
17 giving away of alcoholic beverages by the glass or package,  
18 including growlers, to the public or to members of a private  
19 club or otherwise allows consumption of alcohol on the  
20 premises.

21 K. Smoking in a cannabis consumption area on a  
22 licensed premises shall be allowed only if the cannabis  
23 consumption area is in a designated smoking area or in a  
24 standalone building from which smoke does not infiltrate other  
25 indoor workplaces or other indoor public places where smoking

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1 is otherwise prohibited pursuant to the Dee Johnson Clean  
2 Indoor Air Act.

3 ~~[J.]~~ L. Licensees are specifically allowed to  
4 conduct other licensed activities, including activities  
5 pursuant to the Hemp Manufacturing Act ~~[except for sales of~~
